Getting there

BY PLANE

For the journey from Australia to Austria there are plenty of options to choose from. Besides flying into Vienna, Austria's capital, it is also possible to fly into Munich or Zurich for easy access to Austria's ski resorts in the west. One stop offers are available from Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Adelaide and Perth with airlines like Emirates, Qatar Airways, Etihad, Lufthansa and Singapore Airlines. Salzburg and Innsbruck Airport are great options if you are already in Europe.



BY CAR

Austria Driving in Austria is uncomplicated and offers great flexibility and freedom. An excellent motorway, highway and federal road network connects Austria with all its neighbouring countries. All main border check points are open day and night.

BY TRAIN







From Vienna Airport ÖBB Railjets depart twice hourly for Salzburg and there are hourly connections to Innsbruck, Tirol's capital city in the heart of the Austrian Alps. Austrian Federal Railways (ÖBB) offers train connections from Munich and Zurich to any major city in Austria.

SAALBACH-HINTERGLEMM - SALZBURGER LAND

One of the largest ski areas in Austria, it features a wide variety of terrain and ski runs for all skill levels, and is known as a freeride paradise. One of its highlights: more than 60 cosy mountain huts.

A lakeside ski resort with stunning alpine views, Zell am See offers over 400 km of slopes in the Ski ALPIN CARD area, connecting with Kaprun and Saalbach. Glacier skiing, lakefront charm, and a vibrant winter atmosphere make it a perfect blend of nature, sport, and relaxation.

HOCHKÖNIG - SALZBURGER LAND

More than 120km of pistes are draped in almost exclusively easy and intermediate slopes, making this area perfect for beginners and families, especially with its Schneewutzel kids club.

ALPBACH - TIROL
